




Dugdug and the Rasgulla Author: Priya Narayanan


Late one night as the village of Bholapur slept and snored, the Moon opened his eyes with a POP and scanned the land below him.




Worried about her favorite pup, she swung into action letting out a series of sharp whistles in what seemed to be a secret code.
